Exciting future for Kings Hill

The time has come to start thinking about future development at Kings Hill and we would like to hear what you – the people living and working here – would like to see as part of that future development.

In order to do this, we are organising a day of public consultation on Thursday, 6 September and hope as many of you as possible will come along to let us know your views. More details about the day will follow.

The original masterplan for Kings Hill was set out in 1989 and one of the major reasons for Kings Hill's success is that those plans have evolved and have been adapted over the years in response to the everchanging economic and social climate.

"We know this has been the right thing to do because Kings Hill remains a hugely popular place to live and work," said Andrew Blevins. "In the next phase we need to address the national under-supply of homes,



which is particularly acute in the south east.

"Central Government is doing its best to promote more carefully planned residential development to meet this crisis and, in particular, it is promoting the notion of that development being 'sustainable development'. Kings Hill is just such a development – it has its own hard and social infrastructure and has been recognised as the Gold Standard of sustainable development.

"For all of these reasons, we believe Kings Hill is well placed to accommodate some further, *carefully* masterplanned, residential expansion as part of a review of the masterplan to ensure that we have the right balance of employment and residential uses going forward. Clearly, as part of this review we will need to consider the provision of any new infrastructure that is needed, to properly accommodate any change going forward, including, for example, schooling."

To help make the public consultation on 6 September as accessible as possible, open sessions will be held at different times of the day and there will be workshop areas, manned by the relevant specialists, to discuss specific ideas. Liberty staff will also be on hand.

Following the open day, the development team will look at all the suggestions with a view to incorporating as many as possible into a revised masterplan. There will be further opportunities to provide feedback over the following months for anyone who misses the public consultation, or who has further thoughts – details to be announced.

Thank you

A big thank you to all Kings Hillians who responded to our online questionnaire canvassing your opinions on possible new amenities at Kings Hill. We have analysed the hundreds of responses we received and so here is a resumé of your comments.

It appears that many of you would like a mobile phone mast at Kings Hill and some of you would like another pub.

The results also showed that a petrol station was high on the list, as are a BMX/skate park and a retirement village.

13% would like an adventure play area for older children and 6% would like a bowls club. Other suggestions are netball and squash courts, a duck pond, an arts centre and museum, a cinema – and even an IKEA!

A bank and post office were popular suggestions for additions to the retail area, followed closely by requests for a Marks & Spencer, a wine bar and an 'English' restaurant.

We also asked about your families and your thoughts on issues affecting Kings Hill. The vast majority – 85% – rated the on-going standard of maintenance at Kings Hill as either above, or meeting, expectation; 71% said they 'loved' living at Kings Hill and 21% have at least one family member working for a business on site. A full breakdown will be posted on the website over the summer.

"We are very grateful to the hundreds of people who took the time to respond to the questionnaire," said Andrew Blevins. "We aim to provide the facilities people living and working here want so it is good to get the feedback. We will take all the suggestions, and the comments on a new pub and a mobile phone mast, into consideration when planning future amenities.

"Soon we will be asking for your opinions on the next phase of development, as you will see from the front page story."

Centre of Excellence

New signings on the business park include Vaillant Group and The Specialist Works, which is taking more space to expand its business.

Vaillant Group, Europe's largest manufacturer of heating technology, is establishing a Centre of Excellence at Kings Hill, the first for the company in the South East.

It has taken space in 6 Alexander Grove where the new centre will provide training facilities for engineers and showcase the company's product range to customers and employees. Jim Moore, Northern Europe Regional Director and UK & Ireland Managing Director of Vaillant Group, said that the company chose Kings Hill "because it is a prestigious location which we feel reflects our leading position within our sector and is easily accessible to a wide range of our customers."

Work starts on control tower

As many of you will have noticed, work has now started on the control tower to restore it to its former glory.

The Art Deco Grade II listed building is regarded as one of the best examples of this type of control tower built in the inter-war period. It plaved a vital role during the Second Word War, responsible for the safety of the pilots based at West Malling Airfield, who included Wing Commander Guy Gibson. Liberty fully appreciates that people have strong feelings about the building's history and this was a major factor when planning its future use.

The building will be fully refurbished, replacing the original steel casement windows with identical replicas, building new balconies and retaining the original concrete staircase, balustrade and timber handrail.

Two single storey extensions will be added either side of the central building, one of which, together with the whole of the ground floor of the original building, will become a Costa coffee shop. The other side will be given over for a variety of publicorientated cultural and community uses.

The upstairs will be converted into office space and the area outside the building will be landscaped to create an area of grass and a paved square where people can sit and relax. There will also be space for shows and exhibitions and an area set aside for artworks and memorabilia.

"This is a landmark building and we have taken a great deal of advice in planning the most appropriate use for it, whilst retaining respect for its past," said Andrew Blevins. "The control tower was a living, busy, focal point of the former airfield and we wanted to retain that character, but widen its use within the community. We did consult local museum experts and were advised that turning it into a museum simply would not be viable. Finding a new working use for the building, and acknowledging its historical importance, will ensure that it will be around for future generations to enjoy.

"In addition, we have engaged a specialist culture and placemaking agency, Futurecity, to commemorate the control tower's past by creating a series of artworks based on the stories of those who were connected with the building, or who may have memories of it."

Futurecity will be gathering as much information as possible about the heritage of the site and are keen to speak to people about their memories. More about this in the next newsletter.

Service restored

When Kings Hill resident Hugh Furness said that he would like to buy the recently closed independent 'Post n' Packing Warehouse', Liberty ensured that the deal was done and the service relaunched all within a matter of weeks.

Hugh, a regular user of the service for his East Peckham barcoding and IT business, has lived at Kings Hill for ten years and knew from the reaction of fellow Kings Hillians that the service would be much missed.

"I am very involved with the community so I knew how the closure of the service was affecting people," he said. "I approached Liberty to see if I could take over the lease on the premises and they were so incredibly helpful and supportive that the deal was done, and the business up and running, within two weeks."

Hugh has taken over the business with Martyn Filby, a colleague at the East Peckham business, and reemployed three of the former Post n' Packing Warehouse staff, including office manager Mike Oliver.

The new company, now

called Post and Packing UK (www.postandpackinguk.com), offers a wide range of postal and courier services, both personal and for businesses, which include DX document exchange for lawyers; mailboxes; document storage and archiving. Worldwide express delivery and logistics company DHL has already approached the new company about becoming one of its hubs.

Post and Packing UK is based in 5 Liberty Square and is open 9am to 5.30pm Monday to Friday and 10am to midday on Saturdays.

Heath Farm update

Liberty and Kent County Council (KCC) have been working hard with the Kings Hill Parish Council to sort out the management of Heath Farm leisure and sports amenities – and a formal agreement has now been reached for the Parish Council to lease and manage the facility on behalf of the community.

Work has already been completed on the five new pitches at Heath Farm with the peripheral areas having been planted with native hedging and wild flowers. Construction of a pavilion and a sixth artificial pitch will start soon.

Liberty has also prepared an area of land at Heath Farm for allotments, which hopefully should be available from September. The pitches, pavilion and allotments have been gifted to the community by Liberty and KCC.

"Heath Farm will provide an excellent facility for the community and we are delighted that the Parish Council has agreed to run it," said Andrew Blevins.
